January features two Adult Education sessions. Join us in the southeast corner of the Fellowship Hall after worship where coffee and treats will be waiting for you. Please join us!




January 11th Being Human in an Inhuman World

The world is profoundly human – just as it is profoundly oak, or elephant, or mushroom. But our theologies, worldviews, and economies often pressure us to live inhumanely, in ways that do not recognize the sacredness of all life. We will also consider how our economy views the world, and actions we can take to move us toward a world that values all of life.

January Mission: Homeless Helping Homeless and Lincoln Center

The Lincoln Center is a project of Homeless Helping Homeless that is operated in conjunction with volunteers, staff members, and supporters.

Individuals experiencing homelessness are some of the most oppressed individuals within our society.

The Lincoln Warming Center was created to specifically act as a resource to all those experiencing homelessness. Staff and volunteers are working to build a center that can act as a refuge for individuals during times when the weather is inclement or when otherwise needing respite from the stress of surviving without the basic necessities in life. The center is a point of outreach & support for individuals experiencing homelessness or extreme poverty.



The Center is a 501(c)3 non-profit and will attempt to mediate any immediate need within the organization's means. Within the center they operate a 24/7 community snack bar available to visitors and guests which features fresh water, hot coffee, an assortment of snacks, and meals each day to the guests and others in need. The Center also has resources available for guests to use to contact potential employers and housing opportunities, such as wi-fi, computers, and phones. Televisions in the Center are to help visitors pass the time through entertainment, gaming, or otherwise.

Volunteers are needed. Volunteers can choose to work directly with Lincoln Center residents (playing games, teaching a skill, serving snacks, etc) or by chores that support the Center (sorting donations, stocking shelves, cleaning, etc.). Hours are flexible and need is 24/7.

Funds are needed. Please contribute to January's Mission of the Month and be sure to indicate on your donation that it's for Lincoln Center.

In-kind items are needed. Current needs include Men's and women's sweat suits size medium through 4XL; winter gloves of all sizes; backpacks; blankets; bath towels and wash cloths; pillows; lotion; men's hoodies size medium through 4XL; women's hoodies size medium through 4XL; men's boxers of all sizes; women's underwear size small through 2XL; men's shoes/hiking boots size 10-14.

DONATION CENTER

At this time, we are collecting for several food and hygiene needs. Donations that are not put on a shelf, labeled bin or in a cart will be delivered to our supported agencies at the discretion of the Mission team. Whenever possible, canned goods should have easy-to-open pop top lids, a can opener may not be available for most recipients.

LETTER FROM YOUR PASTORS



Reimagining Our Relationship with Money

Blessings to you and your family as we enter 2026. The church year may have begun back on November 30 with the first Sunday in Advent, but the “calendar” year is a major marker too, if only as a practical matter. The tax man cometh, as they say (we’re not sure who “they” are, but they’re right), and so does our own **Annual Meeting on January 25, 2026, following 9:00 am worship.**

We hope you plan to attend that meeting, because we have a lot to celebrate as we enter 2026, as well as great reason for hope and gratitude. God has been very good to our congregation and, at least as far as your pastors can tell, we have been faithful to our mission—the same mission we share with every Christian congregation on earth: **to proclaim the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.**

A Mission-Driven Budget

That mission is the reason our congregation exists. It is also the guiding principle behind the budget proposal we will be asked to approve at the coming annual meeting. Your council—particularly the Finance committee—has worked hard to prepare this proposed budget, and we hope you will take the opportunity to review it ahead of the meeting. When you do, you will see a thorough accounting of past giving and expenses, as well as a faithful expectation that the generosity Atonement has already demonstrated will continue to grow.

More than just the numbers on the page, we invite you to see that the proposed budget is a **mission spending plan**. This can be a hard thing to see because balance sheets don’t always tell a story, but your pastors can, and so can your council (we bet you could too).

The Stories We Tell About Money

The culture of the world in which we live tells us a story about money, to be sure. Our culture tells us that money is a measuring stick of how valuable we are; that it is the only way to find safety, security, and power; that there is never enough, so we should hold onto as much as we can; and, finally, that our money is *ours*. It is a pretty bleak story—and it is also untrue.

The Good News of Jesus Christ tells a different story. It tells us that money is one of many gifts God gives us to use and manage, but it doesn’t make us valuable, lovable, safe, or free. Money isn’t bad; it is a useful tool. It’s much easier to store and exchange the value of our work in a dollar than in a pair of chickens, for example! The best thing about having money is not storing it up, but using it to make our lives and the lives of our family and community better as we follow our mission—to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ!

Imagine the Transformation

We invite you to appreciate the spreadsheets and imagine what they point to: our dollars given to Atonement growing up to be something far greater and more meaningful than what we give, multiplied by the power of God’s Holy Spirit.

Consider that when you give to Atonement, the talent, time, patience, and effort you put into earning and saving that dollar is transformed:

- **It becomes the sheet music** for our choir, and the direction and accompaniment of our music staff that enriches our worship.
- **It becomes a Bible** placed in the hands of someone new to faith or growing in faith.
- **It provides the light and heat** for the dozens of partner ministries and hundreds of people who gather here every month: seeking support in recovery from addiction, finding enough to eat, or ensuring our neighbors don't freeze under bridges.

We are not kidding—if you ask our fabulous administrator Laura for a list of who uses our space, it will blow your mind. Every cent is a seed planted for the sake of the Gospel. We invite you to look at the budget not as a bill to be paid, but as a roadmap for the proclamation and ministry we are doing together.

Abundance vs. Scarcity

The cold, stark month of January is often a time where “scarcity” feels very real. But our faith calls us to a different perspective: **Abundance**. Scripture tells us: *“And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work”* (2 Corinthians 9:8, NRSV). Living with an abundance mindset means trusting that God provides enough for our needs and enough to share. When we view money through the lens of Jesus’ resurrection, it stops being a source of anxiety and starts being a tool for love.

Spiritual Practices for January

Parting with hard-earned money isn’t easy when the world reinforces an unhealthy relationship with wealth. This month, we invite you to try one of these practices:

1. **The “Gratitude Audit”:** Before paying a bill, take thirty seconds to name one thing that money provided (warmth, a meal with a friend, the ability to support Atonement, or a gift for someone else).
2. **Intentional Fasting:** Choose one “extra” you usually spend money on but do not need and “fast” from it for one week. Donate that amount to an organization doing God’s work (maybe church, but follow your heart’s guidance). Consider it a tangible sign of your faith and reflect on how that added generosity feels.
3. **Pray Over Your Wallet:** Literally hold your wallet or sit at your computer before you do your banking and pray: *“God, help me to remember that this belongs to you. Guide my hands to use it to proclaim your love.”*


