News of the new Memorial Fund Policy was shared. There are now 4 ways to designate gifts: General Fund, any line item in the budget, Legacy Fund and the new Operating Endowment. Adult Ed session on February 15th will be a deep dive into the street assessment of approximately \$371,000 because of street and sidewalk construction that will be done this summer on both 28th and 29th Streets.


SENIOR QUILTS

LETTER FROM MINNESOTA ELCA BISHOPS

To the congregations, members, and friends of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in Minnesota:

We, the six ELCA bishops in the state of Minnesota, are writing today with a word we hope will anchor and sustain all of us in the days to come.

In recent weeks, several thousand ICE and Border Patrol agents have been sent to our state. Their tactics of stopping and questioning our neighbors and their aggressive interactions with the communities where we live have caused fear and anxiety. We grieve the killing of Renee Good on January 7.

All of this comes after other experiences of devastating violence in recent months and years.

We are tired, and our hearts are broken. Yet we are not deterred.

At every act of violence, we have seen you respond with compassion and resilience. This has been a season marked by profound grief. It is also a season in which we have refused to be defined by what the baptismal liturgy names as "the forces that defy God."

To our pastors, deacons, chaplains and ministry leaders, we say this: we are with you. We give thanks for your faithful leadership, for your courage and discernment, and for all the

ways you live into the vocation we share. Dear friends, we believe you have been called and anointed for ministry in this time and place. It is our honor to serve with you.

To all members of our congregations, and our neighbors throughout Minnesota, we say this: we commit ourselves to continue to pray, to advocate and act alongside you, and to use the resources and gifts we have to work toward the fulfillment of the reign of God, so that all may know the abundance of life Jesus comes to give (John 10:10). We encourage you to remain connected to one another and actively support the efforts in your communities to meet the needs of those directly impacted in this time of fear and intimidation.

This past Sunday, congregations across our state marked the Baptism of our Lord. It is a celebration and remembrance of the moment when Jesus himself was baptized, and the voice of God broke through the heavens to declare, "This is my Son, the beloved, with him I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17).

We believe the voice of God still speaks. We know that all our neighbors bear the image of God. Through the waters of baptism, we have been named and claimed as beloved children of God.

It is our sure confidence in this truth that sustains us. We know we are God's children, and we know that you are, too. We pray that this truth will continue to anchor, guide and compel all of us as we work for justice for all people in every place.



We also know there are voices around us that challenge the truth of who we are and who our neighbors are. It is our fervent hope that every one of us would remain deeply rooted in our identity as God's beloved.

To that end, we write with a word of encouragement: go to church or your place of worship, ground yourselves in Scripture, and surround yourselves with those who will echo the voice of God for you. This is the nourishment that will sustain us.

Along with Presiding Bishop Curry, we "join calls for a thorough investigation into this case, accountability for the shooting and a de-escalation of ICE enforcement across the United States."

When the challenges that surround us are overwhelming, we cling to what is true. We serve a God who sees us and who enters into the beauty and messiness of human life in the person of Jesus the Christ. Because of what God in Christ has done, we know that God is with us and we are not alone (Romans 8:38-39).

Until the day the reign of God arrives in full, we continue to work for justice and peace, grounded in prayer, rooted in Scripture, and compelled by the power of the Holy Spirit.

WORSHIP NEWS

Lenten services, including Ash Wednesday, will be at 12 noon starting February 18th (with soup served afterwards) and 6:30pm (with pizza etc served prior).

Along with the paraments, and wall hanging, the mobile in the narthex changes again for Lent. The Lenten theme this year is "Making Peace with Ourselves". Wednesday services will include the Holden Prayer, speakers, and temple talks.



Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season of 40 days (excluding Sundays) before Easter Sunday. Ash Wednesday focuses the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy. Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence. Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:

- Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).
- Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. Even on Ash Wednesday, this most penitential day, we receive ashes in the form of the cross, the same symbol placed on our bodies with water in our baptism. Even in this ashen mark of death, we anticipate the new life of Easter.
- Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried into the ground or as ashes are placed in a columbarium. "We commit this body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 284).
- Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God.

The 40-day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection.

The Lenten season culminates with Holy Week, which includes Palm Sunday and the joyous celebration of Easter. Resource:



LETTER FROM YOUR PASTORS

By now, most of us have seen those "classic" scam emails or texts. You know the ones—you get a message that looks like it's from one of your pastors, asking you to quietly buy gift cards for an "emergency."

We hate to bring this up again, but the threat is hitting closer to home than ever.

Pastor Tim writes:

Last night, I returned home from Wednesday worship to find my wife, Paula, in tears. Her parents live in Michigan just north of Sylvania, Ohio, near her twin sister, Priscilla. Her mom is 88 years old and cares for her dad, who has dementia. They still live on their own in a patio home.

While her mom was using the computer, a message popped up claiming the device was infected and required her to call a number to "fix" it. She called. In the confusion, she shared her driver's license number and was talked into revealing information about her checking account to the scammers. It was a devastating violation for vulnerable people trying to live independently, and it just fills Paula and me with sadness.



I share this personal pain because Pastor John and I want you to know how high the stakes are. Scams are already dangerous, but criminals are evolving. We want to make everyone at Atonement aware of these "run-of-the-mill" scams and a new, even more sophisticated threat: **Artificial Intelligence (AI)**.

We used to say, "seeing is believing." If we saw a video of someone speaking, or heard their voice on the phone, we knew it was them. Unfortunately, that's just not true anymore.

Recently, Father Mike Schmitz, a Catholic priest and podcaster in Duluth, had to issue a warning to his 1.2 million followers. Scammers used AI to create videos that looked and sounded frighteningly real to swindle people. In one fake video, the "**AI** Father Mike" warned that "*spots for sending prayers are already running out*," urging them to click a link and pay money to secure a blessing before it was too late!

Father Mike laughed it off, saying, "*I would never say that.*" But the problem is, people who don't know him personally might not realize it's a fake. The voice sounded slightly robotic, but the image was wearing a similar clergy shirt and speaking with his cadence and usual enthusiasm.



Here is the part that worries us: It isn't just famous priests who are targeted. Cybersecurity experts warn that local pastors are becoming popular targets for these scams simply because there is so much footage of us online. *Here is what is truly mind boggling:* Scammers can feed our sermon audio into a computer, and after editing out all the gospel, great jokes, and amazing stories, they can generate a phone call that sounds exactly like our voices, asking you to "transfer funds."

So, how do we spot the fakes?

- **Be suspicious.** If you see a video or get a voicemail from one of us that seems "off" or incredibly urgent, take a breath. Does the mouth match the words perfectly? Does the voice sound a little robotic? Is the picture not quite as handsome as your pastor?
- **Verify before you act.** If you receive a request for money, gift cards, or personal info that sounds like us, hang up and call the church office directly. Don't reply to the text or click the link. Your pastors are relatively easy to get ahold of, and our amazing Office Manager Laura knows what's going on.
- **Know our hearts.** We will never ask you to click a mysterious link to "secure a blessing" or ask you to buy cryptocurrency. If the request involves secrecy or extreme urgency, it's almost certainly a scam.

Technology can be a wonderful tool for ministry, but we have to keep our guard up. If you are ever in doubt, please reach out to the church office immediately.
