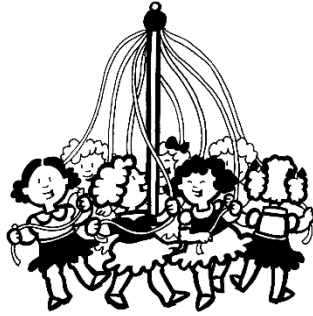

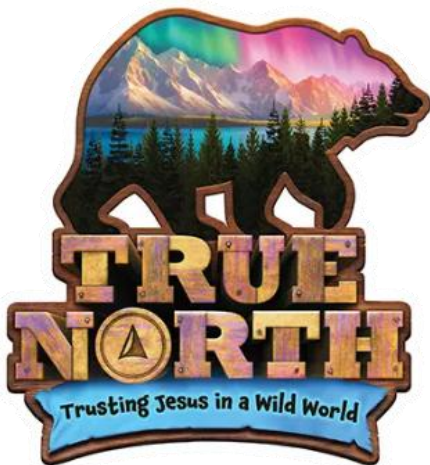

WHY IS THERE A CANOE IN THE NARTHEX?

Atonement owns multiple canoes that are 25 – 30 years old, and they have served Atonement well - providing a safe adventure for many adults and youth in the beautiful Boundary Waters. Unfortunately, the material the canoes are made of breaks down and becomes brittle over time. All of the canoes have had multiple repairs, there is an example now in the Narthex at church. This raises concerns for their continued durability and safe use.



Again, this summer Atonement pastors and youth are planning multiple Boundary Waters Canoe trips. Before they leave in late July, Atonement would like to purchase 4 new canoes that are large, durable, lightweight, and reliable. Then, everyone can feel safe, confident, and comfortable when they hit the Boundary waters this summer.

Atonement can purchase discounted canoes, but they are costly, between \$2,700 - \$3,300 a piece. If you are willing to donate towards the replacement of the canoes, please, make your check out to Atonement Lutheran and in the memo line write BWCA Canoes. We appreciate whatever you can give. LETTER FROM YOUR PASTORS

Your pastors work diligently to stay informed about local, national, and global events; drawing from a wide range of news sources (though we steer clear of TV news—gotta keep those blood pressure levels in check!). We also engage with theological journals, blogs, and other resources that challenge us to think theologically—that is, to view life in all its complexity through a faith-filled lens. Rooted in the Lutheran tradition, we seek to discern how God’s Word and work intersect with our everyday experience and understanding.



The American Lutheran Publicity Bureau publishes one of the journals your pastors read, Lutheran Forum. This month’s Pastor’s page is inspired by and quotes at length a Letter from an editor published in a recent *Lutheran Forum* entitled “What One Pastor Sees” in hopes that you might also take an interest in other sources of theological reflection and know where to find them (Matthew Borrasso, *Lutheran Forum* March 2025. American Lutheran Publicity Bureau, pp 4-5). Quotations will be indicated and will all refer to the preceding citation.

When preparing to preach and teach, your pastors begin by reading and praying over the relevant passages of Scripture—whether from the lectionary, a lesson plan, or the Catechism and its biblical roots. We seek the Lord’s guidance, trusting that the Holy Spirit brings the Word to life and uses preachers to give it voice for today. Ideally, our preparation also includes conversation with other preachers and fellow Christians, whose insights and challenges help sharpen and deepen our understanding.

We think about those people who share the Lord’s body and blood with us. We also think about and pray for our neighbors, family members, and our congregation, for and to whom we have a sacred duty to preach and teach faithfully and who are, in the words of associate editor Matthew Barrasso, “*people for whom Christ shed his blood, breathed his last, and emptied his tomb*” (LF p. 4).



We consider this a holy duty that has profound real-world, day-to-day impact for the people of Atonement who have called us to serve alongside and among them, and for those neighbors who have not connected to this vibrant community. For example, your pastors are heartbroken by stories we have heard from members of this congregation about friends they have lost and family relationships that have been damaged because so many of our fellow citizens, including many otherwise faithful Christians, have chosen allegiance to “*policies and programs and procedures and platforms over people*” (LF p. 4).

In Matthew 22:36, a lawyer asks Jesus, “Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?” Jesus replies, “‘You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.’ This is the greatest and first commandment. And the second is like it: ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’” This way of understanding the law—through the lens of love for God and neighbor—was clearly central to Jesus’ teaching. And it seems He intends for it to be central to our lives as well.

Because our neighbor's well-being matters to us, we are called to wrestle with questions such as:



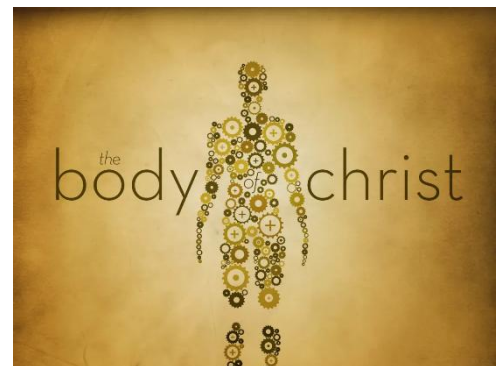
- How will we take responsibility for the consequences of our political choices—especially when those choices cause suffering for another person made in the image of God?

- How should we respond—both in word and action—when we find ourselves in a time like this, marked by division among those who are called to be sisters and brothers in the Spirit?

As we struggle to answer these questions, Mr. Barrasso's article entitled "What One Pastor Sees" articulates some of your pastors' concerns. We'll quote it at length, as we found his sentiments relevant to today's political and cultural atmosphere:

Any pastor engaged in the lives of people knows the hurt, anger, fear, and frustration some folks are feeling, as well as the pride satisfaction, delight, and gratifications others are experiencing. Pastors also feel some of those, perhaps a bit of both... One of the things in vogue right now is the dehumanization and demonization of anyone who disagrees with me – whoever the me is. We are polarized. We have picked our sides. You are either for us or against us. The church, though, can't play that game. Because...whether we affirm a specific program or not...we don't have the word that permits us to treat the world the way the world treats us (LF p. 4).

Educating ourselves, voting, and taking responsibility for our choices and their impact on our neighbors are essential civic duties—privileges we are fortunate to have, particularly when much of the world lacks such freedom and self-determination. For members of the Body of Christ, it is an even greater responsibility to align our political judgment with the Word of God and to ask ourselves:



- When our chosen candidate wins, can we still empathize with—and actively seek the good of—our neighbor whose candidate did not?
- When the policies we support become law, can we still show compassion toward—and work for the good of—our neighbor whose values are no longer reflected in those laws?
- If we are unable to show empathy and seek the good of those who think differently from us when the tide of power turns against them, what does that reveal about our commitment to Christ and His teachings?

We wish to conclude, as Mr. Barrasso did his letter, with the words of Psalm 82. We ask that you read it aloud, responsively with someone else if possible, or by reading the fine print in a loud voice and the bold print in a whisper.

*God has taken his place in the divine council;
in the midst of the gods he holds judgement:*

***"How long will you judge unjustly
and show partiality to the wicked?"***

*Give justice to the weak and the orphan;
maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute.*

***Rescue the weak and needy;
deliver them from the hand of the wicked."***

*They have neither knowledge nor understanding;
they walk around in darkness;*

all the foundations of the earth are shaken.

*I say, "You are gods,
children of the Most High, all of you;*

***nevertheless, you shall die like mortals
and fall like any prince***

rise up, O God, judge the earth,

for all the nations belong to you!

The HELPS community is addressing the root causes of poverty in Guatemala with a unique integrated approach focused on four key areas: agriculture, community development, education and health care. Intensive training and microloans help smallholder farmers build the capacity to boost crop production. The ONIL cook stove and water filter create safe homes, sustainable communities and a clean environment. The HELPS primary school equips rural students with the skills to succeed. Volunteer medical teams provide life-saving preventive health care, surgery and education in rural areas. There are a number of Atonement members who are volunteers.

2025 BIKE BUILD HOME 500 - JULY VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY



Central MN Habitat for Humanity is hosting a **5-day**, 500 km fundraiser, July 8-13 for the purpose of raising money for CMHH. **Bike Build Habitat 500** will honor Loretta Anderson on Saturday, July 12th. Loretta rode her bike in at least 3 Bike Build events and was a dedicated Habitat volunteer. **Atonement will provide and serve the evening meal at 6:30 pm on that day. We also plan to provide snacks and volunteers for a**

rest stop on that day's route. Riders will be staying at St. John's Prep in Collegeville. Last year the bikers raised \$177,000 in the Winona area. Bikers register at <https://bikebuildhome500.org/> in which 65-85 riders are expected. Volunteers from area churches and businesses are needed for the following: 1) Breakfast or Supper, 2) Rest stops along the routes 3) Support along the routes (flagging turns, intersection awareness) and 4) Food donations. Please be supportive of this unique fundraiser in any way you are able.

Although Habitat for Humanity was April's Mission of the Month. Kris Lehman from Atonement and Gene Boysen from Bike Build Habitat 500 will speak briefly during announcements on Sunday, May 4th and share information at the Adult Education session following worship service.

REPORT OF FIRST QUARTER FINANCES

Overall giving for the first quarter of 2025 is up by \$25,000 over last year. Although general fund (what keeps the lights on and staff paid) giving is down by \$8,000, giving towards our designated funds such as mission of the month, capital campaign, building use, canoes, etc. increased over \$33,000 compared to last year!!! Thanks to the support and generosity of the congregation these gifts make the missions at Atonement possible.

THE NEVER-ENDING CELEBRATION



Have you ever had so much fun doing something that you wished the day would never end? Maybe you had a wonderful birthday celebration, or you had fun singing songs around a toasty campfire. Wouldn't it be great if times like these could last longer? Celebrations can last a long time, and that's exactly what happens at Easter. Easter is so important that it lasts longer than one day. In fact, it lasts fifty days! There are seven Sundays in those fifty days. If you look around church during the seven Sundays of Easter you will see and hear things that tell you the celebration is still happening.

Easter music is different from Lenten music. We sing loud, joyful songs about Jesus' resurrection. You will see lots of flowers. The big candle near the baptismal font--the place where people are baptized--that candle is lighted. In fact, candles are always lighted at special times. The big candle by the font is called the paschal candle, and it's different from all the candles in church. It's lighted during the Easter season and for baptisms and funerals. When this candle is lighted it is a reminder that nothing can stop Jesus' love for us--not even death! In church the Easter celebration lasts all the way until Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit visited Jesus' friends. But a little bit of Easter is always with us, every day of our lives. That's how important Easter is!
